AP World Language and Culture

- •AP World Language and Culture is taught in an immersion-type setting with heritage and non-heritage speakers working together in the same classroom.
- •While heritage speakers have a "leg up" on their non-heritage speaking classmates in terms of auditory comprehension, both groups work together to learn challenging academic language and advanced concepts.
- •It is highly recommended that students take level 4 (or Spanish for Careers Applications) BEFORE taking AP.

What students should expect...

- •The first few weeks of the course can be challenging due to the fast-paced nature of the curriculum.
- Students should expect a reasonably heavy workload and a big payoff in ability improvement.
- Students will improve the depth of their knowledge of grammar and vocabulary.
- Students will speak in Spanish 100% of the time.

AP Spanish Language and Culture

- Workload Nightly homework to include (approximately 1 hour of homework between class meetings):
 - Auditory Comprehension
 - Reading Comprehension
 - Written Expression
 - Cultural Comparisons
 - Organized and Linear Thinking

Books and materials

- Students will use Vista Higher Learning textbooks as well as other sources for exam preparation.
- •Students will learn about current events, global challenges, art, culture, and literature through a variety of articles from various sources, most notably articles, audio and videos from the internet.
- •The AP WL Language and Culture course follows a theme-based approach to learning and incorporates perspectives from both countries that speak the language.

Level 5 vs. AP Course

- •Level 5 and AP can be taken in any order. Students who start Spanish early may take Level 5 before AP to give them more experience before taking the AP course.
- •Students completing AP as juniors who wish to continue with the language may take level 5 after AP.
- •Some students may choose level 5 instead of AP if they already have a heavy AP load and want to learn the language without the pressure of the exam.

What we really want

 The ultimate goal of high school world language study is to prepare students to communicate and interact with heritage speakers (when possible) here in our community as well as abroad.
